SECTION A: MINUTES AND RELATED ISSUES

1. Adoption of the agenda

2. Minutes of the meeting of 10 September 2015

The minutes of the meeting of 10 September 2015 were approved, subject to a minor change on page 6, and signed by the Chair.

3. Matters arising from the minutes

3.1 It was <u>noted</u> that the Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) policy was under consideration (Item 3.1).

- 3.2 It was <u>noted</u> that the drafting of proposals with respect to issues related to the external examiners' process was ongoing. Feedback has been sought on a draft set of guidelines and a final document is expected to be ready shortly (Item 3.2).
- 3.3 It was <u>noted</u> that follow-up with respect to Programme Regulations was on the agenda of this meeting (Item 6.1).
- 3.4 It was <u>noted</u> that feedback had been provided to Registry with respect to the Revised Examination Regulations (Item 7).
- 3.5 It was <u>noted</u> that the re-submission of a legacy re-admission request for a student seeking re-entry to the BA in Journalism programme had been approved by Chair's Action on 25 September 2015.
- 3.6 It was <u>noted</u> that a request from the Faculty of Science and Health for a derogation from Paragraph 4.3 from Marks and Standards was approved by Chair's Action on 12 October 2015. The derogation facilitated a student registered on the Bachelor of Nursing Studies programme to take a module from the stand-alone framework offered by the School of Nursing and Human Sciences.
- 3.7 It was <u>noted</u> that a joint request from the Faculty of Science and Health and Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences for a derogation from Paragraph 4.3 from Marks and Standards was approved by Chair's Action on 23 October 2015. The derogation facilitated a student registered on the BA in Contemporary Culture and Society programme to take a module from the stand-alone framework offered by the School of Nursing and Human Sciences.

6 Marks and Standards Issues

6.1 Programme Regulations Guidelines

It was <u>noted</u> that a meeting had taken place between the Secretary of USC and the Associate Deans for Teaching and Learning and Secretaries of Faculty Teaching Committees to discuss the content and format of Programme Regulations. An updated template and guidelines document were devised, and following feedback from the Faculties, the documents as circulated were finalised for the approval of USC. It was <u>noted</u> that the template and guideline documents would be distributed as soon as possible to Faculties, for roll-out for 2016-2017.

It was <u>noted</u> that the Faculties were pleased with the outcome of the review of the Programme Regulations and expressed appreciation for the assistance provided by the Secretary of USC.

The Programme Regulations Guidelines were approved.

7. Any Other Business

7.1 Semester 1 Examination Timetable (Ms Gillian Barry attended for this item)

A memo briefing USC on the preparation of the examination timetable was tabled. The document provided the background to the production of a second draft of the examination timetable and the constraints which are making the scheduling of the timetable increasingly complex and difficult.

The constraints include *inter alia* the exclusion of Saturday 23 January 2016 as an exam day, the loss of exam venues, the increased complexity caused by crossteaching, and the large variety of optional modules available to students. All possible permutations had been explored but it had not proved possible to schedule all examinations in eleven days, without scheduling two examinations in the one day for eleven students.

It was <u>noted</u> that the second draft of the examination timetable would be circulated to Faculties during the week commencing 16 November 2015.

While appreciating the complexity of the issue and acknowledging the necessity to schedule two examinations in the one day, the Associate Dean for Teaching of Learning from the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences requested that where two examinations occurred for students in the one day that they wouldn't be two languages. Ms. Gillian Barry undertook to explore different possibilities in this regard.

It was <u>noted</u> that a set of principles with respect to examination timetabling, drawing on the experience of semester 1, will be drafted for the future consideration of USC.

7.2 Legacy re-admission case for the MA in Industrial Relations

It was <u>noted</u> that the Chair had received a request for advice with respect to granting an additional session to a student originally re-admitted in 2012. Due to illness, the student concerned had not been able to engage with the programme within the timeframe allowed by USC and the Progression and Award Board, which had met

on 11 November 2015, had sought to grant the student an additional academic session. However, as USC had granted re-admission to the programme and the student's registration would now be outside of the timeframe allowed, Registry recommended reconsideration of the re-admission by USC.

The Chair indicated that he had recommended to the Programme Chair she advise the student to exit with a lesser award, and if that was not feasible, and taking the timeframe in account, he would deal with the outcome by Chair's Action. This was agreed.
