

# Launch of Praying Together

Pupils, teachers and people connected with Church of Ireland primary schools contributed to a new book of prayers which can be used in school assemblies. 'Praying Together: Prayers for Primary

School Assemblies' was launched on Thursday February 6 by the President of **Dublin City** University, Prof Brian MacCraith.. The book contains a wide variety of prayers

The book is the result of a project which began in Spring 2019 when the editor Jacqui Wilkinson had an idea for a new resource and project in which the network of Church of Ireland schools could get involved. She contacted all Church of Ireland primary schools last year inviting teachers and pupils to write new

retires or there is a school inspection. Others may become regular features of assemblies marking the seasonal events of the school year such as sports day or 6th class graduations. There are also prayers when an urgent response is required, for example, in times of sickness or sadness, or if there is a national or local tragedy.

At the launch Prof Brian MacCraith and Prof Anne Looney,

Executive Dean of the DCU Institute of Education, spoke of the importance of listening to the student voice. They

Four principals, one recently retired, very generously gave up their Saturday morning in late November to present at a Seminar for 4<sup>th</sup> year B.Eds in the Church of Ireland Centre on Leading and Teaching in Small and Growing Schools. Lesley Denniston principal of All Saints NS, Mullingar, Martha Woolmington principal of Howth Rd NS, Dublin 3, Janet Twigg recently retired principal of All Saints NS, Waterford and Sarah Richards principal of Whitechurch NS, Dublin held the students spellbound for a few hours with their stories of life in a small school.

Martha had everyone laughing at the tales of child and teacher survival in a school turned building site. Janet advised on how to keep kindness (and biscuits) to the fore in every relationship, even with the Department inspector. Sarah Richards explained with how her school has sought to keep the sense of family and community to the fore as Whitechurch expanded. Lesley explained the importance, and the fun, of being part of the school team.

Each of the presenters reminisced about their own time as students and confessed to being surprised, but delighted, to take on the role of Principal. The students really appreciated the Seminar and focused on how much they learned from these principals' expertise and wisdom. Some also noted that it was the first time they had a real chance to consider the positive aspects of being a school principal.

The Centre was very grateful to Mr. Pauric Clerkin, CEO of the Irish Primary Principals' Network, who also gave up his Saturday morning to chair the seminar.

The Seminar was the final element of the module 'Teaching, Leading and Learning in Small Schools' taught and co-ordinated by Rev. Prof. Anne Lodge. As part of that module, students also had a full morning's workshop on the Incredible Years programme facilitated by the wonderful Michael Logan of Archways. This is the last time we will have the good fortune to benefit from Michael's wisdom because he is retiring. All in the Centre wish him well. He has been doing greatly appreciated workshops on positive behaviour management with our students since 2010.

#### Ethos in schools



## Religious Education Certificate (Follow Me) 2020

All Hallows' College 26 March, 2 April, 23 April and 30 April 2020 5-8pm

This Certificate is offered to existing teachers in Church of Ireland and other Protestant primary schools who did not undertake their initial teacher education qualifications in CICE or through DCoo4 linked to the Church or Ireland Centre, DCU; and who have classroom experience teaching the Follow Me RE programme. The General Synod Board of Education sponsors this course as part of their support for schools in the Church of Ireland, Methodist, Presbyterian and Society of Friends network. The course is led by Jacqui Wilkinson.

The course is comprised of a series of workshops and accompanying coursework leading to the awarding of the RE Certificate in Follow Me. As well as an exploration of the strands and content of Follow Me other special topics include 'Infants and Play', 'ICT and RE', 'Enquiry based learning in RE', 'Ethos and parish school links' and 'Handling the big questions with senior classes'.

Former participants have reflected: 'I really believe that I walked away with a greater amount of knowledge relating to how to facilitate Religious Education lessons in a fun and creative way'.

'I have thoroughly enjoyed attending this course and would highly recommend it to anyone teaching in a Church of Ireland school. My



knowledge has increased two fold, I have built up a fantastic bank of resources and I without doubt know my teaching style of the subject has changed for the better'.

# Research projects – sharing of experience



The 4<sup>th</sup> year B.Eds had three presentations from recent graduates on their dissertation findings and on the process of undertaking research. The Centre is grateful to Dr. Ken Fennelly for giving up his time to chair this seminar.

Jenny Galbraith introduced 4<sup>th</sup> years to the benefits of the school garden for children and teachers alike. She argued that engagement with the school garden benefited children both academically and socially as well as benefitting the wider school community.

Clodagh Dougherty explained how important the relationship between co-operating teachers and student teachers is, especially in helping student teachers to develop confidence and efficacy in their inclusive practice.

Elsa Griffin focused on the infant years and the importance of play. She explored how both teachers and pupils benefit from using the playground and other outdoor areas for children's play and learning. The 4<sup>th</sup> years had many questions, mostly focused on the process of doing a final year project. They also had a few questions about job applications and interviews. This gave rise to a further special event that will take place during the school Easter break for the Church of Ireland Centre B.Eds on preparing job applications and undertaking interviews for teaching posts.

Springdale NS links with Raheny Community Nursing Unit

For the last number of years, senior students from Springdale NS have entertained the residents of the Raheny Community Nursing Unit with Christmas carols and songs every December. In the summer term of 2019, we were invited to sing again at their annual Alzheimer's Tea Day. Following this event we invited some of the residents to join us in the yard for our annual Ice Cream Day. It was over an ice cream cone that we started a wonderful relationship with our neighbours and a fantastic project of cooperation and inter-generational friendship.

Since the beginning of September 2019, we have organised weekly community link sessions. Six to eight students, accompanied by a teacher, visit the residents in the nursing unit. Our children are very fond of their next door neighbours. They spend an hour each week catching up with each other while taking part in many different activities. Some of these activities have so far included discussing their favourite books and movies over a cup of tea and juice, having a sing song and dance along, arts and crafts, board games and using a wonderful interactive table that the nursing unit kindly received funding for. Through these activities the members of the group share stories, learn about each other and build friendships.



The children have all thoroughly enjoyed each session and have all been disappointed when their turn has come to an end. So far students from 3<sup>rd</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> have had the opportunity to be involved. This term we are looking forward to bringing some of our younger students in with us. We have already made plans for a sports day and teddy bears' picnic in early June when all children involved through the academic year will join the residents to celebrate the friendships and relationships that have been built.

We have had very positive feedback from all involved children, parents, teachers, residents and staff. It has so far been a wholly enriching experience and a link that we are keen to continue to nurture over the coming months and hopefully years. ## School News Abbeyleix South NS:

Two **major projects** recently took place in the school. The first was the erection of a **polytunnel** in 2015 and the second the creation of an **Outdoor Classroom** in 2017.



#### THE POLYTUNNEL:

Thanks to our ever hardworking, fundraising Parents' Association our dream of a polytunnel was realised in 2015. We could not believe the space inside! Our parent body was called upon to get the tunnel ready for classes to begin. This happened

quickly and before we knew it we were planting vegetables, herbs and flowers, everything from leeks, beans, carrots, potatoes, strawberries, scallions, spinach, lettuce to flowers like sunflowers and marigolds .The

vegetables are tended to during break times and classtimes, such was the enthusiasm for time in the polytunnel. Some of the produce grown is brought home to be enjoyed while more is used in our school server where our pupils enjoy cookery classes.

Our polytunnel is a place which helps our pupils to learn more about where their food comes from, about making food choices for a healthy diet and about eating and cooking seasonal foods that they grow. We held a workshop in our polytunnel with author Fiona Dillon. Fiona planted more herbs and vegetables with our pupils, who also had the

opportunity of filming some "Youtube Videos" based on vegetable gardening.

THE OUTDOOR CLASSROOM: The

town of Abbeyleix was chosen to represent Ireland in the Entente Florale Europe 2017 Competition in June. In our school we decided to transform an area of waste

land into a beautiful amenity for all our community to enjoy.

Developing this area involved a community-wide effort with parents helping to clear the space and the



local community and school families donating the materials. Where possible all the items used were recycled. We created three Bug Hotels, and planted lots of flowers and plants that would draw in bees and assist with the school's

Pollinator Plan.

We left part of our outdoor classroom as a "meadow". Here we planted a variety of apple trees and buddleia which attract different butterfly species to our wildflower garden.

Our Outdoor Classroom is very much enjoyed by our pupils. We bring them outdoors for classes when possible and also use it when we have workshops. It provides endless opportunities for integrating



curricular areas and it provides a living context in which our pupils can study.

Laois County Council very kindly gave us an Environmental Education Workshop on Biodiversity as part

of our preparations for our Fifth Green Flag. We prepared and planted a butterfly bed. We undersowed with a mixture of wildflowers. We also sowed lupin, sedum(ice plant), giant poppy, purple top (verbena), buddleia and



dahlia. Wild flower seeds were placed in little pots in our tunnel to avail of the heat and shelter and

later on they were transplanted into our wildflower garden.Our hard work paid off and on 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2018 we were proud to raise our fifth Green Flag for Biodiversity!

#### Our Polytunnel and Outdoor

**Classroom** both provide an outdoor learning environment and a means to create a sense of space for all of our pupils. They put the natural world at our pupils' fingertips and offer a rich context for exploring Science, Nutrition, Maths, Art and much more.

Both spaces are maintained by our pupils who were actively involved in their creation. They were involved in the planning and building of the Outdoor Classroom which gives them a greater sense of ownership. They love the change from the regular classroom to the great outdoors and love to get their hands dirty!

## School News Billis NS, Co. Cavan

#### Experiences of the Shared Education Programme 2017-2020

The Peace IV Shared Education Programme is a cross-border initiative which is completely

funded through the European Regional Development Fund of the EU. It is scheduled to run until March 2020. It was designed to enable schools from different religious and socioeconomic backgrounds, to work in partnership providing opportunities for pupils, teachers and community to engage in collaborative and meaningful learning experiences.

The Collaboration and Shared Education (CASE) project has resulted from a partnership with the <u>Education</u> <u>Authority</u> (EA) in Northern Ireland and <u>Léargas</u> in the Republic of Ireland since September 2017. It provides



direct, sustained curriculum-based contact between the partner schools.

Billis (C.O.I.) National School in Co. Cavan in partnership with Knocktemple (R.C.) National School have been involved in the CASE project for the past 3 years. During this time, we have been involved in collaborative projects including history, process drama, literacy and learning to play Ukulele. Pupils have thoroughly enjoyed the opportunities which the programme has offered and have benefited from the social and educational experiences involved.

This year, pupils from 1<sup>st</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> class in both schools have been involved in the programme with a focus on choir singing and STEM. Teachers in both schools were trained in the use of Beebots and Lego-We-Do which enabled them to instruct the pupils themselves. By not having to bring in experts in this area, it meant that extra funding was available to fund the purchase of sets of Beebots,




Lego-We-Do and Chromebooks, which the schools will have going forward. The pupils were trained in choir singing with the support of a music facilitator.

Celebration Days are to be held for the various class groupings at the end of the programme together with a joint school trip to Explorium Dublin, Ireland's National Science & Sports Centre.

There are many positives from participation in the Shared Education Programme. It does however involve careful planning, co-operation and dedication on the part of the teachers involved in both schools. Shared Education officers provide advice and guidance to schools from the initial application stage right through to delivery. Planning Days, with paid substitute cover, is provided to release teachers to draw up plans, work out the logistics, reflect and write up reports at the end of the year. It is very much a team effort involving our school Principals, B.O.M. and our wonderful school secretaries who arrange bus transport (pupils travel to their partner school in blocks of 5 weeks), paying the bills and ensuring the necessary returns are made monthly.

## Other News Church of Ireland: Disestablishment and Beyond Conference, Royal Irish Academy, Dublin.

On 27<sup>th</sup> Feb 2020, Rev. Prof. Anne Lodge took part in Panel 3 of the Disestablishment Conference talking about the Church of Ireland's role in education in the Republic of Ireland since 1969. She described the changes to both primary and post-primary sectors in the last 50 years and outlined how Church of Ireland schools, along with other minority faith schools,



had long been places where those of other beliefs were included and made welcome. She explained how the schools' Anglican ethos helped the acceptance of diversity. The fact

that faith formation is left to families and parishes means that the schools are Christian places of learning but are not seen as places of indoctrination.



At their best, Church of Ireland schools are child-centred, democratic places where all voices are heard and where different opinions are valued. During the panel discussion at the end of the session, she argued that their flexibility is a real strength for Church of Ireland schools as Ireland becomes a more secular place.

The panel was chaired by broadcaster Aine Lawlor and also included Dr Martin Mansergh, Senator Ivana Bacik and Dr Andrew Pierce.
