The successful candidates will also have demonstrated that their work can contribute to national and/or international public debate and will have shown that they have the potential to win external funding in this area.

The successful candidate will be expected to contribute significantly to curriculum development, teaching and administrative activity in the School of Law and Government. They will make a substantial contribution to the development and delivery of the School's existing taught programmes, and in the planning and curriculum delivery of future developments in politics and international relations.
