As part of this role the researcher will be required to participate in the DCU Research Career Framework. This framework is designed to provide significant professional development opportunities to Researchers and offer the best opportunities in terms of a wider career path.

Background & Role

Applications are invited from suitably qualified individuals for this 0.5FTE 1-year fixed term position (0.5 FTE) as a postdoctoral researcher at Dublin City University. This position is funded by the HEA North South Research Programme. The post offers an exciting opportunity to join an interdisciplinary and inter-institution collaboration between Dublin City University and Queen's University Belfast. The research aims to co-produce, with parents and health and social care professionals, a decision-making framework for planning the place of end-of-life care for children and young people with life-limiting, life- threatening and terminal conditions, and their families, on the island of Ireland. The successful individual will be based in the School of Nursing, Psychotherapy and Community Health at Dublin City University.

Principal Duties and Responsibilities

Reporting to their Principal Investigator the Postdoctoral Researcher will conduct a specified programme of research on planning the place of end-of-life care for children, including:

- Recruiting parent and health professional participants
- Organising and conducting interviews and focus groups
- Developing and managing an online Delphi survey
- Coordinating and facilitating co-production workshops
- Analysing qualitative and quantitative data
- Developing a decision-making framework
- Targeted knowledge translation initiatives
- Liaising with internal and external stakeholders
- Overseeing project management coordination under supervision of the research team
- Publishing and disseminating research outputs in peer-reviewed journals
- Assisting the Principal Investigator in identifying and developing future research/funding initiatives
- Carrying out administrative work associated with the programme of research as necessary including regular funding agency reports and internal reports
- Carrying out additional duties as may reasonably be required within the general scope and level of the post

Minimum Criteria

Applicants should hold a PhD in a health or other relevant discipline (e.g., social science, psychology, allied health, health services research).

In addition, it is desirable that the candidate has:

- experience in effective networking and building strong working relationships within and across organisations, disciplines and professions;
- excellent communication, interpersonal and organisational skills, be able to take initiative and work under pressure to tight deadlines, and have the ability to work effectively as part of an interdisciplinary team;
- well-developed qualitative and quantitative research skills and a publication track record;
- an awareness of the ethos of palliative care and an ability to undertake research with appropriate sensitivity in the area of end-of-life palliative care;

strong leadership and influencing skills with expertise in project management and experience of working with communities and health service users

Candidates will be assessed on the following competencies:

Discipline knowledge and Research skills – Demonstrates knowledge of a research discipline and the ability to conduct a specific programme of research within that discipline

Understanding the Research Environment – Demonstrates an awareness of the research environment (for example funding bodies) and the ability to contribute to grant applications

Communicating Research – Demonstrates the ability to communicate their research with their peers and the wider research community (for example presenting at conferences and publishing research in relevant journals) and the potential to teach and tutor students

Managing & Leadership skills - Demonstrates the potential to manage a research project including the supervision of undergraduate students
