Airfield Estate

Ireland | 1974

Airfield Estate is a social and charitable hub, located in Dundrum, and is Co. Dublin's only urban working farm and gardens. The estate was left to the people of Ireland in 1974 by the Overend sisters, who strongly believed in self-sufficiency and sustainability.

The estate was completely renovated in 2014 and now serves as a place for people of all ages to engage in activities related to food and nature. They offer and run various events and programmes for children and adults, and educate visitors on the impact of their food choices on society and the planet.

An Carn Community Association

Ireland | 1992

An Carn is a community association that was founded with the aim of regenerating the rural area of Sleacht Néill / Carn Tóchair in Co. Derry. An Carn has developed a range of different projects and enterprise ventures to support the regeneration of the community in a sustainable way.

Their main aim is to promote and restore the Irish language in the local area through their initiatives. Such initiatives include a café and restaurant, a nature reserve, an arts centre, and wind turbines. All financial surplus generated by these initiatives are reinvested into the community association. For example, the wind energy produced by the turbines is sold to the grid and the profits are reinvested into other ventures, such as the cafe and youth activities.

Ireland | 2017

Bounce Back Recycling is a social enterprise that provides employment and training opportunities to people that face barriers to employment. It's a recycling company with the goal of stopping as many mattresses and furniture ending up in landfill. The organisation works with many different groups to recycle unwanted waste. Using a social enterprise model, the income generated is used to pay operating expenses to run the business and to pay wages to employees.

Castlecomer Discovery Park

Ireland | 2007

Castlecomer Discovery Park is a social enterprise in Co. Kilkenny that was developed by a local community group. The park was created for Castlecomer locals, and people further afield to enjoy and engage in physical exercise and nature.

The discovery park was developed to attract tourists to the area, create jobs for the local community and regenerate the local economy. In addition, the development of the park aimed to bring members of the community together again. The park is home to a coal mining museum that pays tribute to the coal miners who worked in Castlecomer, as well as a craft courtyard. The park also offers educational programmes for primary and second level students. All profits generated go directly towards keeping the park open and developing it to create further social and environmental impact.

Certified Proud

Ireland | 2020

Certified Proud is an accreditation membership body for businesses and organisations that are LGBTQ+ friendly and accepting. Members of Certified Proud sign up to acknowledge that they proactively provide safe spaces for members of the LGBTQ+ community.

The accreditation process involves three components. The first part involves the commitment to embedding the seven Certified Proud principles within organisations. The second part is a yearly audit of these businesses and organisations to ensure that they are continuing to embed the principles to create safe spaces for the LGBTQ+ community. The third part is the membership fee that each organisation pays, where 40% of the fee is reinvested into the Certified Proud fund. This fund directly gives back to the LGBTQ+ community, by providing support to LGBTQ+ charities and non-profit organisations.

Deaf Enterprises

Ireland | 1987

Deaf Enterprises is Ireland's only dedicated employer of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Community. The organisation was set up to tackle the high rates of unemployment among Cork's deaf community. Since then, Deaf Enterprises has grown to provide employment training and placement opportunities. The services it provides include furniture design, manufacturing and restoration, a motor school for deaf people, as well as training for tutors and sign-language interpreters.

Money earned from these services is used to further develop the organisation and improve the facilities and services that Deaf Enterprises provides.

Delancey Street Foundation

USA | 1971

Delancey Street Foundation is an organisation that supports people who are struggling to turn their lives around. It helps former substance abusers, ex-convicts, homeless people and others who have nowhere else to turn to. It provides residency to these individuals for a minimum of 2 years. During their time at Delancey Street, residents receive academic and vocational training as well as a high school equivalency degree.

Delancey Street has facilitated the development of a number of social enterprise ventures, and has provided residents with the necessary skills to be able to work in these social enterprises. Such ventures include catering, handcrafted products, landscaping services and the Delancey Street Christmas Tree Lots. These ventures have supported the development and running of the foundation's training schools and rehabilitation centre.

Irish Seed Savers Association

Ireland | 1991

Irish Seed Savers Association is a 20-acre farm with a mission to protect Ireland's food crop heritage for future generations. They focus on the conservation of heirloom vegetable seeds, maintaining the country's only public seed bank, as well as the conservation of Irish heritage apple trees, having over 180 unique varieties in their orchards.

Irish Seed Savers run educational workshops for different groups to raise public awareness about the vulnerability of Irish agricultural biodiversity. In addition, they collaborate with government departments, universities and gene banks across the world. They also have a cafe and shop where individuals can buy organic heirloom seeds and a range of other products.

Moyee Coffee

Ireland | 2016

Moyee Coffee is a coffee social enterprise that is trying to make the coffee industry more fair and sustainable, sharing more of the value from coffee with coffee growing countries, to avoid profits going directly towards a small number of large multinational companies. This has been called the FairChain model and is the first of its type in the world.

Moyee Coffee set up its first roastery in Ethiopia and developed a roadmap for a living income for coffee farmers which also explored ways to protect and rejuvenate wildlife habitats on the coffee belt. As of 2016, an outpost in Dublin was established to bring Fairchain coffee to the UK and Ireland.

<p>Our Table provides training, work experience and paid employment for international protection applicants, refugees and for the wider migrant community in Ireland. They run a café and an accompanying garden. Our Table aims to enable people to learn about the Irish food industry as well as build an awareness of food in multicultural Ireland. Our Table was set up to provide a safe and empathetic space for people to discuss and learn about Ireland's asylum system, Direct Provision. This organisation seeks to raise awareness about Direct Provision among the Irish population, and the need to bring an end to this system.</p>

<p>PACE is a voluntary sector organisation that aims to support the integration process of people with criminal convictions and bring about positive change in their lives, helping prevent further harm in the community. PACE helps to achieve this through a number of services, which includes Training and Social Enterprise. PACE Social Enterprise's mission is to create jobs for people who have previously been in prison or on probation and find it hard to secure employment.</p> <p>Initiatives that have been successfully created by PACE Social Enterprise include MugShot, a coffee and catering business, as well as a business for manufacturing handcrafted garden products, such as garden furniture and planters. These initiatives help prepare the social enterprise employees to progress into mainstream employment. In doing so, they aim to positively change the attitudes of potential employers and communities towards former prisoners.</p>

It does this by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mapping the locations of publicly accessible drinking water taps across the country • Encouraging businesses to provide free tap water to customers • Making free tap water accessible at least every 400 metres in towns and cities • Encouraging local authorities and water utilities refurbish and install public drinking water taps <p>The organisation is a not-for-profit that generates revenue by selling sustainable products, such as indoor and outdoor drinking water dispensers, and reusable water bottles. The surplus is reinvested into continuing to reduce waste pollution in Ireland.</p>
