MINUTES

The Chair welcomed Professor Heather Ruskin, as representative of the Associate Deans for Research, and Mr Brendan Tolan, as representative of the Directors of Computer Services, Education Services and the Library, to membership of the University Standards Committee.

1. Adoption of agenda

The agenda was adopted subject to the inclusion of an additional item as Item 10 and the consequent renumbering of Items 10, 11 and 12 as Items 11, 12 and 13 respectively.

2. Minutes of the meeting of 1 June 2006

Confirmed and signed by the Chair.

3. Matters arising from the minutes

3.1 Follow-up actions from the last meeting were reported.

- **3.2** <u>Noted</u> that the proposed new streams on the taught postgraduate programmes in the School of Electronic Engineering had been submitted to, and approved by, the Academic Strategy Committee. (Item 3.4)
- **3.3** <u>Noted</u> that the issue of validation would be discussed again by the Academic Strategy Committee at its meeting of 1 November 2006. (Item 3.6)
- **3.4** <u>Noted</u> that no further action was to be taken at this time in relation to a proposal to offer an existing part-time programme on a full-time basis. (Item 3.8)
- **3.5** <u>Agreed</u> to recommend to Academic Council at its meeting of 11 October 2006 that, with effect from the academic year 2007/08, taught Master's programmes should have a 90-credit weighting, with the exception of those involving only two semesters, which would remain at 75 credits. <u>Agreed</u> that Mr Griffin would draw up the proposal for Council and that, if it were approved, an inventory of all relevant programmes would be prepared and procedures for effecting the changes formulated. (Item 9)
- **3.6** <u>Noted</u> that the Irish Universities Association had made a submission for funding, through the Strategic Innovation Fund, for the development of a sector-wide initiative related to student satisfaction protocols and student feedback mechanisms. (Item 12)
- **3.7** <u>Noted</u> that discussions were ongoing with the University of Paris IV Sorbonne about a matter pertaining to the 'cotutelle' agreement between it and St Patrick's College. (Item 16)

4. Confirmation of decisions taken electronically and by means of Chair's action in July and August 2006

<u>Noted</u> that, in the first week of July 2006, the USC had considered and made recommendations about a range of issues relating to research students and external examiner appointments and that, in August and September 2006, a number of decisions on special-case admission to taught programmes had been taken by means of Chair's action.

5. Standing orders and membership

5.1 The draft standing orders were <u>approved</u>, apart from the fact that section 4 remains unfinished since final decisions on membership are still to be made.

- 5.2 <u>Noted</u> that one of the three remaining vacancies had now been filled by Mr Brendan Tolan, representing the Directors of Computer Services, Education Services and Library. <u>Noted</u> that it was hoped that a second vacancy would be filled by a Head of School and that the identity of the Head concerned would be known before the 12 October 2006 meeting of the USC. <u>Agreed</u> not to fill the remaining vacancy for the moment, pending the outcome of some ongoing developments in the University.
- **5.3** <u>Agreed</u> that, in view of the likely importance of both Quality issues and Student Affairs issues to the work of the USC, the Directors of each these Units would be invited to attend a meeting of the USC, at which relevant issues would be discussed, as necessary but at least once per year.

6. **Proposals on committee structures**

- 6.1 <u>Agreed</u> that, pending the appointment of a Director of Graduate Research, the issues relating to research students (i.e. approval of external examiners for research students, special-case admission requests from research candidates, approval of requests to transfer to the PhD register, confirmation of continuation on the PhD register, requests from research students to re-register under 'write-up' status pending the discontinuation of this system, and requests from research students to change supervisor) would continue to be dealt with by the University Standards Committee.
- 6.2 <u>Agreed</u> that it would be desirable for the USC to have an opportunity to contribute to the current discussion on the creation of a graduate school. <u>Noted</u> that a paper on the issue had been discussed by Executive. <u>Agreed</u> that a copy of this paper would be requested and circulated to the members of the USC and that the issue would be placed on the agenda for the meeting of 12 October 2006.
- 6.3 <u>Agreed</u> that it would be desirable that a range of issues not specifically related to research students henceforth be dealt with by Faculties. These issues are: approval of Programme Board (or equivalent) minutes; approval of academic structures; special-case admission requests to taught programmes; requests for exemption from modules on taught programmes; approval of external examiners for taught programmes. <u>Noted</u> that the working group on committee structures had agreed that the Senior Faculty Administrators would advise the OVPLI/Registrar by 2 October whether or not this would be feasible given current resources. <u>Agreed</u> that, if the work was devolved to Faculties, a review might be held for example, in early 2007 to ascertain how well the new system was working. <u>Agreed</u> that, in any event and for reasons of timing, the USC would continue to deal with all issues currently within its remit for the purposes of its next meeting of 12 October 2006.

7. Modularisation and related issues

7.1 Update on Phase II Modularisation

<u>Noted</u> that the Associate Deans for Teaching and Learning were formulating proposals based on the outcome of the discussions relating to Phase II Modularisation.

7.2 **Proposal on compensation regulations**

- **7.2.1** <u>Agreed</u> to adopt recommendations 1.1, 1.2, 1.3, 1.4, 1.5, 1.7 and 1.9 within this proposal. The following were also <u>agreed</u>: the practice of requiring double the deficiency of marks in passed modules in order for students to be allowed to compensate in failed modules should be discontinued, but for compensation to apply a minimum precision mark of 45% should be required; where a module is effectively linked across two semesters, a new system (probably involving a new result code) should be used where it is necessary to indicate that the Semester 1 portion of the module has been failed (and it was <u>agreed</u> to investigate the technical feasibility of this); compensation should apply in all years of all taught programmes, undergraduate and postgraduate, and a student who, within regulations, benefits from compensation should not be precluded from being awarded an honours qualification.
- **7.2.2** <u>Agreed</u> that Ms McDermott would draft a revised proposal which would incorporate the recommendations in 7.2.1 above and circulate it to the members of the USC with a request for comments to be submitted by an agreed date. <u>Agreed</u> that the finalised proposal would be submitted to the meeting of Academic Council of 11 October 2006 and, if approved there and subject to technical feasibility, would be notified to staff and students, and implemented, in the current academic year.
- **7.3.3** The Chair thanked the working group on compensation regulations for having formulated the recommendations.

8. Proposals on non-major awards in the context of the NQAI framework

- 8.1 The proposal was <u>approved.</u>
- **8.2** <u>Noted</u> that a programme proposed by the School of Nursing had been validated and accredited, and approved by Academic Council, on an electronic basis in July and August 2006. <u>Noted</u> that this was a Level 8 programme in the NQAI framework and that its original title had been *Post-registration BSc (Hons) in Children's Nursing*. <u>Noted</u>, however, that an issue about the title had arisen whereby external

funding and accreditation for the programme would be available only on the basis that is offered as a Higher Diploma (a title not currently in use by the University), though the level at which it is to be offered remains unchanged. <u>Agreed</u> to recommend to Academic Council that the University create the award of Higher Diploma.

9. Awarding of degrees jointly with other institutions
