Honorary Doctorate Conferring Ceremony

Dr. Martin Naughton, Sr. Stanislaus Kennedy, & President Bill Clinton

Chancellor, Ministers, Excellencies, distinguished guests, colleagues and special friends, on behalf of Dublin City University, I want to welcome you and to thank you for joining us today for this important ceremony for the university.

I also welcome the many students and staff in the audience – the demand for tickets from inside the university was incredible (I can't imagine why!). We are delighted that over 1000 people can be here with us in the Helix as we honour these special individuals.

Yes, I do indeed feel like the very average choirboy coming on stage to **sing solo** after Pavarotti has performed ... and not only Pavarotti ... Kiri Te Kanawa, Placido Domingo and Jose Carreras as well!!

In its short history, DCU has not conferred many honorary doctorates.

Today, Sr. Stan, President Clinton, and Dr. Naughton, you join a short, but distinguished, list of our Honorary Graduates, a list that includes a number of Nobel Laureates:

ETS Walton, winner of the Nobel Prize for Physics, Mother Teresa, John Hume, David Trimble, and Muhammad Yunus each a winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, and our good friend, the late Seamus Heaney, winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature.

As President, I am often asked why DCU awards Honorary Doctorates.

A good question! Let me explain.

Ireland has no national honours system and so it is important that we can recognise and honour outstanding achievements.

The award of an Honorary Doctorate by DCU is **not only** a recognition of **outstanding achievements, of excellence** in a particular field of endeavour, but it is also a public statement of **the values** and priorities that this University cherishes.

In fact, it is the intersection of **excellence** and **shared values** that enable us to

identify suitable candidates to receive a DCU Honorary Degree.

We have listened to the wonderful tributes to each of our honorary graduates - tributes that have captured their outstanding achievements and their impact. Three amazing individuals -- their outstanding achievements are not in doubt. But there is a common thread between them. Each has a particular passion for Ireland and each has transformed its essential tapestry significantly for the better - in ways that matter hugely and personally to the individual citizen: jobs, homes and a peaceful society. Each, in his, or her, own way, is an innovator, a creative problemsolver.

Each has taken risks to advance a vision.

Each, in the words of Seamus Heaney, believes *"that a further shore is reachable from here."*

And, so, it is entirely appropriate that we have chosen these 3 individuals to honour in the best way we can today.

Ladies and Gentlemen, it has been my great privilege today, on behalf of DCU, to confer honorary doctorates on 3 outstanding people.

Sister Stan, Martin, President (Bill) Clinton, we are very happy to honour each of you but, in truth, it is we who are honoured by your presence here and by your acceptance of this award.
