What is the Student Ambassador Programme?

The Student Ambassador Programme is a group of current DCU undergraduate students who are selected to represent DCU to prospective students, their parents and guidance counsellors.

About the Student Recruitment Office

The Student Recruitment Office manage the Student Ambassador Programme. The role of the Student Recruitment Office is to let prospective students know about the opportunities available to them at DCU, whether it is talking directly to a student, or to parents or a guidance counsellor.

What is the role of a Student Ambassador?

The role of a Student Ambassador is to give the real picture about life at DCU. In other words, what it's really like to be a student here from talking about your own experiences, your course, your typical day at DCU to student life, clubs, societies and campus facilities. Student Ambassadors positively promote DCU and the role includes giving presentations, helping at Open Days, conducting campus tours, attending career fairs and school visits. Student ambassadors also contribute to DCU's social media presence by writing student blogs and recording posts for the DCU Snapchat account.

Responsibilities of a Student Ambassador

Under the direction of the Student Recruitment Office, you will:

- Attend higher education career fairs such as higher options in the RDS
- Provide support before, during and after Open Days and other events on-campus. This includes guiding visitors around campus and event set-up
- Conduct guided campus tours

- Attend school visits with a Student Recruitment Officer
- Provide support for student recruitment activities
- Assist the SS&D Team with Orientation week
- Work with other units throughout the University

Skills Required

The skills required to be considered for the Student Ambassador role are:

- Enthusiastic, personable, flexible and motivated
- Good communication skills
- Ability to work as part of a team
- Ability to deal with people from diverse backgrounds
- Positively disposed towards DCU
- Basic knowledge of campus facilities
- Successful in your academic studies
- Ideally an active member clubs and societies at DCU
- Full clean drivers licence is desirable but not essential

Why become a Student Ambassador?

Students participate on the programme for lots of different reasons such as:

- Opportunity to improve communication, presentation, public speaking, networking and leadership skills, which are attractive to employers
- Great addition to your CV
- Making new friends
- Learn about school liaison and student recruitment activities
- Student Ambassadors are paid!

Hours of Work

The hours of work vary and are part-time. It depends on the number of student recruitment events and your availability. Normally hours of work can be between 9am to 5pm Mon-Fri, however some evening and weekend work may be required during busy times.

Remuneration

Student Ambassadors are paid €10.10 per hour

How to apply for the role of Student Ambassador

Interview

Owing to the Covid-19 restrictions we are unable to perform face-to-face interviews. We will review the situation and will correspond with selected applicants on the interview process in due course.

Garda Vetting

Garda vetting is mandatory for students who have unsupervised access to children and vulnerable adults. All successful applicants must pass the Garda vetting process in order to be selected onto the Student Ambassador Programme.

Training

Upon appointment, there will be a one-day training session given by the Student Recruitment Office. It is compulsory that all new student ambassadors attend the training day.
